The Child Development Centre

The first school term of 2019 opened on 21^{st} January. Though the children did not report at the same time, we had above half the number of children that had reported in the first week. The CDC has classes from baby class to grade 5.



Even though the learners have varying challenges which include Cerebral Palsy, Down syndrome, Autism, microcephaly and other physical disabilities, they have improved greatly in the academic performance and other Activities of Daily Living. Though the institution was built in response to accommodating the needs of children with disabilities, we also have vulnerable children without disabilities that are learning at the school. This inclusion contributes positively to children with disabilities because of the interaction.



The CDC has 38 learners of which 24 are boys and 14 are girls. The CDC is growing and the demand to expand the service to reach grade 7 is high because we have challenges placing the children in other schools after they reach grade 5.

To ensure that this is achieved. We have been working closely with the Ministry of Education, the ministry provides Teachers and a Driver to help in the effective management of the centre.

The visit from the ESO special Mr. Haluuma and the SESO Mr. Ngazimbi, gave us a time to discuss on the way forward of the CDC and the director shared his vision of expanding the service provision to Grade 7. The decision to expand the services to grade 7 was reached on because of the challenges that children who reached grade 4 had in accessing further education in other schools.

The decision was made because the Ministry of Health requires a lot of human resource. Despite this turn of events, the District Health Office has assured the office that they will send a nurse as soon as the institution resumes its full operations since there is already a standing Memorandum of understanding.

HFC received funding from Lilian Fund for 32 children with physical disabilities. 40% of these children are at the CDC and the rest are with family and in boarding schools. The amount financed is 110 000 K (\$ 9 030, 5).

This programme is managed by a team composed:

- A Coordinator,
- A Social worker,
- A Physiotherapist,
- A Teacher.



The team visited already:

- ✓ 12 children,
- ✓ 8 families,
- ✓ 4 schools.



It was noted that some children are in the boarding schools and others need to

progress to get skills training. The team is still continuing the visits.
